President Peter Eden

Peter Eden, Ph.D., is Landmark College's fourth president. His commitment to inventive educational models and the need for an "ideal college of the future" drives the vision for LC. Prior to joining LC, Dr. Eden was dean of arts and sciences and professor of biotechnology at Endicott College in Massachusetts. Before this, he was a tenured associate professor and chair of the science department at Marywood University in Pennsylvania, and a research fellow at molecular genetics institution The Jackson Laboratory in Maine. Dr. Eden earned his B.S. at University of Massachusetts Amherst, completed a Ph.D. at University of New Hampshire, and was a postdoctoral fellow at MIT in microbiology, molecular biology, and neurobiology, respectively. President Eden has published many scientific articles, received National Institutes of Health and National Science Foundation grant funding for research, and led the development of many undergraduate and graduate academic programs. He enjoys working closely with LC faculty, staff and students to help create initiatives that keep Landmark College unique and resilient as we serve neurodiverse students.



OUR MISSION

REGALIA

According to the American Council on Education: "The origins of academic dress date back to the 12th and 13th centuries, when universities were taking form. The ordinary dress of the scholar, whether student or teacher, was the dress of a cleric. With few exceptions, the medieval scholar had taken at least minor orders, made certain vows, and perhaps been tonsured. Long gowns were worn and may have been necessary for warmth in unheated buildings. Hoods seem to have served to cover the tonsured head until superseded for that purpose by the skull cap. The assignment of colors to signify certain faculties was to be a much later development, and one which was to be standardized only in the United States in the late 19th century.
