

The Academic Program

High School Program Summer Session Overview

The High School Program Summer Session at Landmark College is designed to teach new skills and strategies to students with learning differences and/or ADHD or ASD. Students are typically those entering their junior or senior year of high school.

Landmark College instructors employ teaching methodologies that combine student-centered approaches with innovative and experiential curricula. Special emphasis is placed on developing a writing process, discovering academic strengths and personal learning style, and the integration of strategies and practice into engaging activities.

With class sizes ranging from 8 to 14 students per class, teaching instructors are available to support students in the classroom. Additional support is also available during the academic preparatory time period, scheduled each evening Mondays through Thursdays.

In the High School Program, each student will enroll in three courses:

1. Learning Strategies Seminar (Traditional Program) or College Living and Academic Strategies (Social Pragmatics Track),
2. One writing class
3. One elective.

Classes meet Monday through Friday, with the first class beginning at 9 am and the last class ending at 2:45 pm. Each class meets for one hour and fifteen minutes. You will receive your class schedule at registration when you arrive on campus.

Library and Information Technology Services (ITS)

The Library, located in the center of campus, also houses Information Technology Services (ITS).

Library

The library is a center of academic support for research skills and assignments. Research assistance is available by appointment or on a drop-in basis. Library staff members are also available to help students use the library's public computers for academic work.

In addition to research support, the Library also offers quiet individual and group study space. The Library is fully equipped, with access to a large selection of current periodicals, computers,

DVD players, and comfortable seating. Our book and DVD collection not only supports academic needs, but recreational interests as well.

The High School Program also offers students the opportunity to visit the Learning Disabilities and AD/HD Research Collection on the Library's first floor. It houses one of the country's largest collections of books and videos on learning differences.

Information Technology Services (ITS)

Computers are available for coursework in the Landmark College Library, on the main floor and in the basement. These computers offer Internet access, scanners, and software including: Microsoft Office[®], Inspiration[®], Kurzweil[®], Dragon Naturally Speaking[®] and Photoshop[®].

The College strongly encourages you to bring a laptop computer with you. Having a personal computer enhances successful work in a college environment, and will be most beneficial during the academic prep periods. Students will be granted access to the internet through the College's wireless network for all devices (computers, tablets, smartphones and other smart devices.) While the College will provide access to computer labs for homework, the availability of public-access computers is limited.

Tech Support

If you are having trouble with printing, scanning, or internet access on any of the public computers, please contact the Tech Support Center located on the second floor of the Library, 802-387-6800. The College is not able to provide technical support for personally-owned computers.

Living on Campus

The residence halls at Landmark College are more than just a place for you to sleep. The Residential program, along with all of the other Student Affairs programs at the College, partners with the academic program in order to provide an outstanding residential living and learning experience.

For many students, moving to the residence halls will be their first experience living away from home. As members of the Landmark community, students have the unique opportunity to contribute to an open and intellectual dialogue about all matters of life. We encourage students to share their ideas and viewpoints, so long as they're presented in a considerate and respectful manner that is consistent with the standards we've established as a community. In doing so, students will be contributing to the diversity of the campus.

Before arriving on campus, students and families are expected to review the Student Handbook for the High School Program online at <https://landmark.edu/HSSPNSO>. These rules apply to every student attending the program.

Residence Hall Staff

Residence halls are staffed with teams of Resident Directors (RDs) and Resident Assistants (RAs). The residence hall staff is responsible for maintaining a safe and secure living

environment for students living on campus. RDs and RAs are part of the daily support and supervision, and are an excellent resource for students who have questions or need advice.

Resident Directors (RDs) are supervisory staff members who have overall responsibility of the residence hall. They directly supervise the RAs, and are available to students to address a wide range of needs. Resident Directors are a good resource for students to use when they need to discuss important issues or concerns.

Resident Assistants (RAs) live on campus and work in the halls. They will provide direct support and supervision to program participants outside of the classroom. They are great resources for questions about life on campus, as well as any concerns about important policies and procedures. Note: in the Social Pragmatics Program, this residential life support role is fulfilled by staff members known as **Advisors in Residence (ARs)**.

Program Assistants (PAs) provide assistance to students during the day to help everyone get to class, to Health Services for illness or to take scheduled medications.

Night Proctors (NPs) are responsible for monitoring the residence halls for the High School Summer Program during the overnight shift. Night Proctors provide assistance to students and staff as necessary.

The Residence Halls

Students in the Traditional High School Program Track will be housed in double-occupancy rooms. The residence halls are single sex by wing, with separate community restrooms and showers for men and women. The residence hall has its own social lounge with flat screen televisions, study areas for extra support during academic prep periods, and a residential staff office, which serves as a home base for the RDs and RAs on duty each evening.

Students in the Social Pragmatics Track will be housed in double occupancy rooms in suites. Each suite will house up to five students and includes a shared bathroom and access to a common kitchen. Limited single rooms are available for qualifying students for an additional fee.

Please note: each residence hall room is equipped with a bed, desk, dresser, and wardrobe or closet. Residence halls have wireless internet access.

No Smoking Policy

It is illegal in the State of Vermont for persons under the age of 18 to possess or use any tobacco product. Landmark College High School Program students, regardless of age, will not be permitted to use tobacco products, vaping devices or electronic cigarettes, regardless of location, for the duration of the program.

Roommate Assignments

Once Landmark receives a deposit from you verifying your intention to enroll in the program, an email will be sent to the student's email address on file which will direct them to access their **Residence** account online. There, students can complete a **Housing Application**. The information provided on this form will help us to identify a roommate that most closely matches with regard to lifestyle and living habits. We ask that students complete this form and

be as specific as possible when doing so, as it will improve the likelihood of finding a compatible roommate. Please email housing@landmark.edu if you have any questions or concerns regarding the Online Housing Preference form.

Laundry & Laundry Facilities

On-campus laundry rooms are available to students in the High School Program and specific times each week have been designated for getting your laundry done. Washers and dryers are located on the lower levels of Davis and Aiken Hall for the Traditional Track and Chumley for the Social Pragmatics Track. Washers are \$1.50 per load and the dryers are \$1.25 per load (prices subject to change). The machines accept coins or debit cards through the ChangePoint system in each laundry room (note: machines do NOT accept Campus Debit Cards).

Cell Phones

Cell phones should be turned off during all classes and activities unless a student uses it to track assignments or access necessary assistive technology. During some classes and activities, instructors may collect phones at the beginning and return them to students at the end of the class or activity. Please keep in mind that not all cell phones will have a usable signal throughout campus.

Visitors

After Orientation and Registration days all visitors, including parents, must check in with Landmark College Campus Safety Office, located in Davis Hall, before meeting the student. Visitors, including parents, are not permitted in the residence halls after New Student Orientation unless they are under the direct supervision of a resident director. Please understand that this is for the safety and well-being of all students.

Leaving Campus

Students are not permitted to leave the Landmark College campus unless they have a signed authorization letter, or a signed release form. (The Permission to Leave Campus form is provided in the enrollment forms, which will be available at landmark.edu/HSSPNSO on or before March 1). One form per off campus trip should be completed, and each form should include the date and time the student will leave campus, the date and time the student will arrive back on campus, as well as the name and contact number of the adult that will accompany the student off campus. Each form must be submitted at least 48 hours before a student's departure from campus. All students leaving campus must check out with a member of the residential life staff before departure.

Program End

Classes are held through Friday, August 2nd, and there will be closing activities for students that afternoon and evening. **We strongly encourage students stay on campus and participate in closing activities through Friday, August 2nd.** The closing activities provide very important opportunity for students to say goodbye to classmates, teachers and staff members. It is highly likely that students will make connections in this program that will last long after the program concludes, and allowing for appropriate time to process their experience is important.

Residence halls close for the High School Summer Program for both the Traditional and Social Pragmatics Track on Saturday, August 3, 2019. **All students are expected to check out of the residence halls and depart campus on Saturday, August 3, 2019 by noon.**

Dining Facilities

All students in the High School Summer Program at Landmark College will have their meals in the Dining Hall, located on the ground floor of Alumni Hall. A café in the Strauch Family Student Center provides pay-as-you go service in the evenings when the dining hall is closed. Emergency College Alerts (Regroup.com)

Students will be required to sign up online for emergency alerts by providing their cell phone number(s) and carrier(s) (for text or voice message alerts). In the unlikely event of an emergency, such as an impending weather event or a power outage, the College will use a program called Regroup to send out important updates or instructions to the number(s) you provided. This service will also be used on weekends to alert students of impending departure from field trips or of upcoming events. Your Room & What You Should Bring

Each student is provided with these basics:

- a bed & mattress (80 inch twin long)
- chest of drawers
- wardrobe or closet
- desk and desk chair
- one overhead light
- each room has at least one window with blinds

You will need to provide your own:

- Reliable and easily managed alarm clock
- Pillows, sheets (80 inch twin long), blanket and/or comforter
- Towels & toiletries (shampoo, soap, razors, deodorant, etc.)
- A fan (strongly recommended)
- Wastebasket
- Clothes hangers
- Book bag or backpack
- Reusable water bottle
- Sunscreen and bug repellent
- Spending money (ATM available on campus)
- Non-halogen reading light
- Flashlight

You may wish to bring:

- Cell phone
- Small Bluetooth speakers
- Study lamp (non-halogen)
- Extension cords (with a built-in **surge-protector**)
- Laptop computer
- Tablet
- A USB flash drive (this will aid in the use of public computers and printing)
- Laundry bag
- Shower shoes
- Shower tote
- Small refrigerator
- Personal entertainment such as books, playing cards, small portable multi-player games

*The College strongly encourages students to bring a laptop computer to campus. Having a personal computer enhances successful work in a college environment. While there is access to computer labs for homework, the availability of public-access computers is limited.

Things you may NOT have in the residence halls:

- No open flames or heating coils (Including matches, candles, incense, toaster ovens, lanterns, space heaters)
- No alcohol, alcohol containers, illicit or non-prescribed drugs, or drug paraphernalia
- No explosives, firearms, knives, firecrackers, or weapons.
- No decorations that hang from the ceiling
- No pets
- No wooden constructions (lofts) or over-stuffed furniture.
- No cigarettes or tobacco products. Vermont state law prohibits the use of tobacco products by minors
- Halogen lamps (these are a fire hazard), or string lights

The college reserves the right to have a student remove an item not on the list that is deemed a fire or safety concern. If you are unsure about an item, email the Student Affairs Office at campuslife@landmark.edu **BEFORE** you pack it.

Finally, students should keep in mind when packing to remember that they will be residing at Landmark College for less than a month. Pack wisely! All of a student's belongings must be able to fit on their side of the room. The college cannot be held liable for any lost, broken stolen belongings, (students will be provided with a key to lock their room) so please use discretion when deciding what to bring. Irreplaceable items should be left at home. We strongly suggest that if valuables are brought to campus, they are covered under the family's homeowner's policy. Alternately, it may be a good idea to consider purchasing renter's insurance for the duration of the program.

What to Expect: The Weather

Summer in southern Vermont generally consists of warm days with very few days reaching above 90 degrees F. However, it is not uncommon to have some warmer days during the program that are accompanied by high humidity. Summer is also the season for quickly moving thunderstorms that can come on suddenly. In general, we are always hopeful that the vast majority of days during the program will see temperatures in the 70s and 80s and nighttime lows in the mid-fifties. That said, weather can be unpredictable and can fluctuate greatly from day to day. Below is a sample list of what might be appropriate to pack in terms of clothes for your stay in Vermont. How much to pack of each suggested item depends on how frequently you plan to do laundry.

- Raincoat
- Light jacket or sweatshirt
- Short sleeved tops
- Long sleeved tops
- Shorts
- Jeans/Long pants
- Pajamas
- Bathrobe
- Socks and underwear
- Swimsuit/beach towel
- Tennis shoes/sneakers
- Sandals, flip-flops
- Closed toe water sandals/shoes (shoes that can get wet)

Keep in mind that there is a program talent show scheduled for the second weekend, so you might want to pack a costume or accessories if there is a chance you will want to perform on your own or with a group. If you play a musical instrument, you may want to consider bringing that to campus. If you expect to choose a physically active afternoon activity, you may also want to pack cleats, gym shorts or clothes appropriate for field sports or other athletic endeavors.

Health Services

A dedicated Health Center for students in The High School Program Summer Program is staffed by nursing professionals and offers routine medical care and manages medication. The program maintains nursing coverage 24-hours-a-day throughout the program. In the event that more extensive medical care is needed, a physician and/or hospital will be selected by the college and parents will be notified immediately. Notice for all students and parents:

Please complete the **Health History** form (included in the enrollment forms which can be found at <https://landmark.edu/HSSPNSO> on or before March 1) and return it to Landmark College with a copy of your health insurance card by the designated date. Over-the-counter medications may only be dispensed to those who have returned the **Over-The-Counter Medication** form (included in the enrollment forms which can be found online on or before March 1) with the signature of a parent/guardian.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION for students taking prescribed medication:

1. Bring **the exact amount** of medication for the three-week program. Count pills and label outside of bottle with the number of pills enclosed.
2. Keep medications in their original packaging/bottle that identifies prescribing physician, name of medication, dosage and frequency of administration. (If a dosage has been changed and is not reflected on the label, have pharmacy print an updated label).
***Prefilled weekly 7-day planners will not be accepted. Medications must be in original bottle.**
3. For students in the Traditional Track, when you arrive for New Student Orientation on July 14, keep a separate container with your medications for that entire day with you as you will be responsible for taking your medications on your own for that day. Students in the Social Pragmatics track do not need to hold medications for the day of New Student Orientation.
4. Starting the day after Orientation, *all medications* will be dispensed by the nurses. The schedule for dispensing medications daily will be 8 am, 12 pm, 5:30 pm, and 11 pm, every day, including weekends.
5. Health Services staff will comply with the prescription directions on the original packaging. Modifications in prescription directions, such as “as needed” or “not on weekends” must be accompanied by a doctor’s note or an updated prescription label.
6. For students taking supplements, please follow these same directions. We cannot accept a bottle of supplements without the student’s name and specific directions printed clearly on the bottle.
7. Students and parents are responsible for checking in with Health Services at the end of the program to collect any unused medications, such as epi pens, or as needed medications. If medication is left behind, it will be sent back via express delivery at the student’s expense.

Recreational & Cultural Activities

Daily Activities

When students are finished with classes for the day, they’ll participate in a variety of activities. Some activities will last all three weeks, some just for the afternoon. Students will participate in a series of activities on Tuesdays and Thursdays, including a visit to nearby Brattleboro, an improvisational theater, and a short walk to the peak of a nearby mountain top that affords views of southern Vermont and New Hampshire. Activities on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays will be ongoing throughout the three-weeks and students will choose among art activities, sports and physical activities, as well several additional exciting options. Students will receive an email in mid-June asking them to select their afternoon activities for Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. Afternoon activities are designed to foster teamwork, build friendships and to reinforce the creation of new neural pathways in the brain by practicing new, positive behaviors.

Additional supervised activities such as movie viewing and ultimate Frisbee may take place during evening free time in the residential halls and other areas on campus.

Weekend Activities

Weekends during the program will include well-planned field trips designed for students to have fun as well as to provide students with opportunities for further growth. The Academic Program is important, but perhaps for some students, an opportunity to connect with other students is equally important. During the weekend of July 20 and 21, students will enjoy a day-long beginner level white-water rafting trip on the Deerfield River, hosted by Zoar Outdoor in Charlemont, Massachusetts. Additional activities, such as barbecues, dances, movies, and an on-campus field day filled with fun activities and events, including a pretty impressive Slip n' Slide, are also scheduled.

A special note about weekends: Students are strongly encouraged to remain on campus each weekend and participate in our scheduled programming. Often, we find that the connections and experiences that occur at these times can greatly increase the overall value of the program.

Students are also able to access the campus game room to play pool, sing karaoke, or just hang out with new friends during weekday free times and weekends. All of our activities are supervised and staffed by RDs and/or RAs who are great resources for good conversation and helping students to stay within the guidelines of the campus community.

Accessibility of Fitness Equipment on Campus

Students in the High School Summer Program will have access to the Click Center fitness room, as well as the gym as staffing permits during the program. Regular hours for these facilities will be determined shortly before the program begins in July.

Cars on Campus

Automobiles and their use are not allowed on campus by participants of the High School Summer Program. Students with parental permission to arrive on campus using personal transportation will be asked to surrender all keys to the Residential staff upon arrival, and park their automobile in a designated area for the duration of the program. Students may not return to their automobiles without the permission of the residential staff until the end of the program.

Postal Services

Letter Mail: Mail will be distributed at lunch in the dining hall Mondays through Fridays.

Shipping Packages & Luggage: All packages and other deliveries are held in the business office in the administration building. Expedited packages would include deliveries by UPS, FedEx, etc. Your resident director will receive an e-mail notice when a package arrives. For anyone traveling by air, it may be helpful to ship items to the College ahead of time. Luggage, packages, and other shipped items will be held until a student's arrival on registration day.

It is strongly discouraged to send cash in the mail (checks can be cashed in the Bookstore).

College Bookstore

The Landmark College Bookstore carries a variety of items, ranging from shampoo and soap to pens and three-ring binders. (All necessary academic supplies, with the exception of writing utensils, will be provided.) It also carries a variety of Landmark College warm-ups, caps, and T-shirts. To purchase items in the store, you may use checks, cash, or credit card (VISA, MASTERCARD, or DISCOVER). The bookstore's phone number is 802-387-6862.

Banking & Money

There is an ATM machine on the first floor of the Strauch Family Student Center and in the lobby of the dining hall. These machines accept most ATM cards and the fee is \$2.00 per transaction (subject to change).

Cashing Checks

Landmark students are permitted to cash a check, travelers check, or money order in the College Bookstore. Checks must be from a parent, grandparent, or guardian or issued by Landmark College. Students can cash one check per week, and no check can exceed \$200.00. Students must show positive identification, and they are not permitted to cash checks for other students. A \$50.00 service fee will be charged to any student for any check that is returned by the bank for any reason.

Campus Debit Card

Students are encouraged to open a Campus Debit Card Account at Landmark College. This account (accessible through the student ID card) allows students to make purchases at the College Bookstore, Fireside Café, beverage and snack vending machines, dining hall, and participating off-campus locations. The Campus Debit Card Account is a convenient way for students to ensure access to spending money for snacks and supplies during the program. Funds can be added to the account at any time.

The College does not give cash advances from the Campus Debit Account, and the campus card does not work in ATMs. If you need cash, you have the following options:

- ATMs are available in the Dining Hall (Alumni Hall) entryway and on the first floor of the Strauch Family Student Center. The machines accept almost any credit or debit card.

The transaction fee is \$2.00 plus any fee your home bank may charge. The ATM is sponsored by Prosperity Bank and accepts the following cash networks: MasterCard, Cirrus, Visa, Plus, American Express, Discover, Star, Pulse, NYCE, CUZ4, AFFN, Accel, Quest, and Shazar.

Travel & Accommodations

Travel by Car

From NYC and points South: Follow I-95 East to New Haven, Connecticut. In New Haven, take the I-91 North to New England. Travel north through Massachusetts and into Vermont. The driving time from New York City is approximately 4 and ½ hours.

From Boston and points East: Take the Mass Pike (I-90) to Springfield, Massachusetts or Route 2 to Greenfield, Massachusetts, then take I-91 North. Travel north through Massachusetts and into Vermont. Driving time from Boston is approximately 2 and ½ hours.

From Albany and points West: Take NY 7 East toward Troy/Bennington. In Bennington, follow signs to VT-9 East/Molly Stark Trail. In Brattleboro, merge onto I-91 North. Follow directions for “Once in Vermont” below. Driving time from Albany is approximately 2 hours.

Once in Vermont: Take exit #4 (Putney) off I-91 and proceed north on Route 5 for approximately two miles. Go past the center of Putney, (which includes a variety of restaurants and shops, a small green and the popular Putney General Store and Pharmacy) and turn right at the Landmark College sign (River Road). If arriving for New Student Orientation, take the second left onto Robert Rhodes Lane.



DIRECTIONS TO CAMPUS

From New York City and points South:

Follow I-95 East to New Haven, Connecticut. At New Haven, take I-91 North to New England. Travel North through Massachusetts and into Vermont. The driving time from New York City is 3-4 hours.

From Boston and points East:

Take the Mass Pike or Route 2 to Greenfield, and then I-91 North. Travel North through Massachusetts and into Vermont. The driving time from Boston is 2 1/2 hours.

From Albany and points West:

Take Route 7 to Vermont. Outside Bennington, Vermont, pick up Route 9 to I-91 in Brattleboro. The driving time from Albany is 2 hours.

From Burlington and points North:

Take I-89 South to White River Junction. Take I-91 South to Exit 4. The driving time from Burlington is 2 1/2 hours.

Once in Vermont:

From I-91 Take Exit 4 (Putney) and proceed North on Route 5 for approximately two miles. Go past the center of town and turn right at the Landmark College sign (River Road South).
