Basic Format for Books

Author's last Name, First name. *Title of Book*. Place of Publication: Publisher, Year of Publication.

One Author

Finlay, Victoria. Color: a Natural History of the Palette. New York: Ballantine, 2002.

Two or Three Authors

Cavalli-Sforza, Luigi Luca and Francesco Cavalli-Sforza. *The Great Human Diasporas.* Cambridge: Persues Books, 1995.

More than Three Authors or Editors

Fawcett, Barbara and others, eds. Practice and Research in Social Work: Postmodern Feminist Perspectives. London: Routledge, 2000.

Essay or Chapter in an Edited Book

Berry, Wendell. "A Remarkable Man." Chap. 2 in *What Are People For?* San Francisco: North Point Press, 1990.

Online Book

Faraday, Michael. *The Chemical History of a Candle.* New York: The Author, 1860. NetLibrary e-book.

Basic Format for Magazine Articles

Author Last Name, First Name. "Title of Article." *Title of Periodical*, Date of Issue, Inclusive Page Number(s).

Magazine Article

Adler, Jerry. "How the Dinosaurs Lived - and Died." Newsweek, June 27, 2005, 44-52.

Basic Format for Journal Articles

Author Last Name, First Name. "Article Title." *Title of Journal* Volume number, Issue number (Date): pages.

Journal Article

Dennis, Simon. "A Memory-Based Theory of Verbal Cognition." *Cognitive Science* 29, no. 2 (March/April 2005): 145-193.

Basic Format for Newspaper Articles

Author Last Name, First Name. "Title of Article." *Title of Newspaper*. Day Month Year, Section and page numbers.

Newspaper Article

Overland, Martha Ann. "Higher Education and the Beyond." *Chronicle of Higher Education.* 1 July 2005, A32-A33.

Basic Format for an Online Database Article

Author's Last Name, First Name. "Article title." *Magazine/Journal/Newspaper Title* Volume number, Issue number (Date): pages, URL (date of access).

Online Database Article Example

Basic Format for a Web Page

Author Last Name, First Name (or Organization name). "Title of Web Page." Title or Owner of website. URL.

Title, Publisher or Director, Place of Publication, Year of Publication.
